HELP PREPARE OCEANSIDE'S LATINO YOUNG MEN FOR COLLEGE, CAREER, AND LIFE WITH REAL WORLD PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCES

The Oceanside Promise partners are aligning our collective resources to better support the college, career, and life readiness of Oceanside's students with an emphasis on Latino young men. The Latino Young Men Success Initiative was launched in late 2018 in order to rally the community to provide additional supports and opportunities for some of our community's most vulnerable youth. Your business or organization can support the initiative in the following ways:

PROVIDE AN INTERNSHIP

Our goal is to secure thirty (30) meaningful, paid or sponsored internships by Summer 2019. You can help by welcoming a young man into your business and providing real world experience and career exposure. A typical internship is 25 hours per week for eight weeks between June and August 2019.

OFFER AN EXPERIENCESHIP (a.k.a. Job Shadowing)

Our goal is to secure sixty (60) experienceships for Latino young men participating in our inaugural pilot. An experienceship can be a few days or several weeks of work experience and career exposure within your business. You will be matched with a young man with expressed interest in your industry or exploring related career options.

SPONSOR AN INTERN @ \$3,000

If providing an internship or experienceships doesn't work right now, your business can still support the cause. By sponsoring an intern, you will help young men get placed in quality internships at sites that have financial barriers to participating.
